NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the National Association of Home Builders work with the U. S. government, the governments of other countries and industry to promote additional opportunities for NAHB members to obtain access to high-quality, stable and affordable supplies of lumber and other key building materials;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that NAHB investigate ways in which it can be of assistance in encouraging competition in the U.S. marketplace among building material suppliers and building material industries;
